## **CUBAN NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION (CNA) HOLDS ITS 6<sup>th</sup> ANNUAL MEETING AT FUN 2009 COIN SHOW JANUARY 08 – 11, 2009 IN ORLANDO, FLORIDA**

The Cuban Numismatic Association (CNA) held its 6<sup>th</sup> annual membership meeting on January 10, 2009 in the Orlando, Florida Convention Center. There were 35 attendees.

President Frank Putrow presided. CNA Officers and Board Members were introduced. Minutes of last years meeting and the financial report were read and approved. Current CNA active membership is about 125. Members reside in 6 countries.

Nominations for the election of a Directorship (2009-2010) held by Rudy Valentin were requested from the floor. Santiago Aragon Jr. placed his name in nomination, and votes were counted for the incumbent Valentin and Aragon. Valentin was elected by two votes. Frank Putrow gave the oath of office to Valentin.

The membership was advised that Andres Rodriguez, the CNA Vice-President since the CNA was established in 2004, submitted his resignation due to health issues (see below). Frank Putrow will mail a Certificate of Excellence and a letter of appreciation to Rodriguez for his five years of CNA service.

Stan Klein reported on the CNA website ([www.cubanumis.com](http://www.cubanumis.com)), describing recent enhancements and future concepts.

The plan to develop a coin book (Cuban Coins 1897-1958) was reported as not practical, due to several methods that collectors are currently using. Instead, Board Member Inguanzo will develop another method, addressing "TYPE" coins only.

CNA Young Numismatists (YN's) will enjoy FREE membership until their 18<sup>th</sup> birthday. Hopefully, this new policy will attract YN membership in the CNA.

Richard Becker presented "Early Banking in Cuba". Rare notes were demonstrated. Frank Putrow presented "The Cuba Patterns of 1995". 176 coins were demonstrated.

The attendees were advised that a CNA Board Meeting will be held immediately after the proceedings to appoint a new Vice-President. After the General business Meeting, 10 donated lots were awarded as door prizes, as well as \$42 cash (half of 50/50). Joe Algazi gave the 50/50 winner an additional \$42 credit at his dealer table. After the door prizes, Emilio M. Ortiz auctioned 8 lots for the "Good of the Club". The lots included donations from dealer/members Santiago Aragon Jr, Rafael J. Fabre, Joe Algazi, and members Frank Putrow and Rudy Valentin.

General Meeting was adjourned at 4:00 pm. Subsequent to the General Meeting, the CNA Board met and appointed Rudy Valentin as the new Vice-President, and Santiago Aragon Jr. to fill the vacated Directorship (2009-2010).

## **OBITUARY**

The CNA has members throughout the United States and in a few foreign countries. Our single most serious problem is two-way communications. As a result, members have passed away, without the CNA being aware of their death. Returned email, or delinquent dues are the usual indication, but a death usually cannot be substantiated. As a result, it is presumed that we have lost members without paying them homage. Please advise the editor if you are aware of the death of any member.

### **Roehrs, Edward H. # 1123. CNA member since February, 2005**

Edward passed away on December 7, 2008. He was 92, and lived in Arecibo, Puerto Rico. He is survived by Helena, his wife of 52 years, and extended family. He was born in Rutherford, N.J. He founded Edward Roehrs Exotic Plants in Puerto Rico in 1949. He followed in the footsteps of both his grandfather, Julius Roehrs, and his father, Edward H. Roehrs, cataloger and owner of the Julius Roehrs orchid collection and a founder of the American Orchid Society.

He was a member of most numismatic organizations, and one of the founders of the prestigious Numismatic Brotherhood "Los Reales".

He managed to accumulate a superb collection of Puerto Rican coins, tokens, paper money, medals, and exonomia, as well as "cut and counter stamped" coins of the Caribbean. His collections also included many items of the West Indies.

Edward was an avid researcher. He published various articles in many periodicals and numismatic publications, such as the Numismatist, N I Bulletin, etc., and in 1964, published a booklet of his collection of Puerto Rican tokens.

### **Archilla – Diez, Efrain # 096. CNA member since March, 2007**

Efrain unexpectedly passed away at the age of 55 during the week of February 20th, 2009, in Naguabo, Puerto Rico. He leaves behind an extended, loving family.

He was a civic leader, and President of WALO Radio and Radio El Yunque, most important radio stations in Eastern Puerto Rico. He was President of the Puerto Rican Broadcasters Association. Nicknamed Efraincito, he succeeded, more than 20 years ago, along with other community leaders, in recovering, establishing, and protecting the magnificent estuary systems between Humacao and Punta Santiago, a haven for hundreds of species, including important turtle – nesting beaches.

Efrain was a very serious numismatist. His interests included Puerto Rico., related U.S. issues, Dominican Republic, Danish West Indies, and Cuba. He wrote the Catalog on Puerto Rican tokens and collected P.R. currency, including Junta Republicana notes, as well as Puerto Rican medals and post cards and casino chips, etc.

## **REEDING – FINE and COARSE**

Fine Reeding (FR), also classified as Small Reeded Edge (SRE). Coins exhibit finer, or smaller points on the reeded edge.

Coarse Reeding (CR), also classified as Large Reeded Edge (LRE). Coins exhibit coarser, or larger points on the reeded edge.

Most of the Cuban 20 centavo coins either exhibit Low Relief and CR, or High Relief and FR. Low Relief and FR have been minted, and are RARE. High Relief coins and CR are VERY RARE, and are EXTREMELY RARE.

A 20 centavo FR has approximately 150 reeds on the coin edge. A 20 centavo CR has about 114 reeds on the coin edge. Side by side, the difference can be detected with the human eye. Individually, they are difficult to determine. Using a micrometer, a FR has 8 reeds in a space of 5/16 inch, while a CR has 6 reeds in the same area of space. Once evaluated, a trained eye could immediately tell the difference.

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

### #1 Christopher sent the following email.

Hello, I'm not a regular collector of Cuban currency. When I was a child an uncle gave me a Cuban Peso that appears to have been autographed in two places on the front by the Ministro de Hacienda who apparently was carrying it in a billfold prior to autographing it. There is also some handwritten text above the signature that starts with the letters "co" and ends with "fecto." Can you tell what that word is? Would this peso be of interest to a collector and could you possibly give me an estimate of it's value? I've included scanned images of it below. Thank you so much for your help! Sincerely, Christopher



### Response by a consensus of 5 CNA members:

Thank you for the email and inquiry about the signed 1949 Peso note.

The consensus is that the handwritten message is "con mucho efecto", which loosely translates to "with much affection". The two engraved signatures appear to be Antonio Prio - Ministro de Hacienda (Treasury Secretary), and Felipe Pazos - President of the National Bank (Banco Nacional de Cuba). And, the two handwritten signatures are probably those of these two officials. The notes could have been given out in some event in Cuba prior to the Revolution, or during many of the anti-Castro events held in Miami after the Revolution.

As regarding value, it might be worth somewhere around \$50.

There are limited sources to sell this type of memorabilia. Look up Lyle Knight currency auctions on Google, and contact them if you wish to sell it.

### #2 NF sent the following email:

*My grandmother passed away and we inherited a Cuban Jose Marti 1916 Gold 5 Peso Coin in a diamond, ruby and sapphire bezel. This appears to be an uncirculated mint condition and possibly a proof coin. Are you able to give me an estimate of how much it is worth?*

Response by Frank Putrow.

Thank you for the email regarding the Cuban 1916 Gold 5 Peso coin.

It must be a beautiful piece in the described bezel.

I would say that the coin is not a PROOF, since they are very rare; less than 100 were minted. I personally have never seen a Proof.

Once a coin is placed in a bezel for jewelry, it is also susceptible to scratches, sweat, etc. These elements usually harm the coin.



Also, many people polish the coin so that it is brilliant and shiny. Both of these actions will damage the luster on the coin, making it less valuable. As a result, coins that were in jewelry have less value than coins that have been protected in coin holders, etc. Without seeing the coin, I would surmise that the coin could be worth about \$230-\$250. The bezel, if gold, could be worth more than the coin, considering the precious gems in the bezel.

I would suggest that you take it to a local coin show, and ask a dealer what the total value might be. I would suggest that you ask a dealer in foreign coins, rather than domestic coins.

### **#3. Mateo sent the following email:**

CubaNumis is a great site. I have a large collection of pre-revolution Cuban coins. I saw the article in CubaNumis about the counterfeit 1897 Souvenir Pesos. I was wondering if you have ever seen these and have an opinion about the good they are? I have attached pictures of a peso. Please look at these and tell me what you think.



Response by Frank Putrow.

Thank you for the inquiry about your 1897 Souvenir Peso. As you know, this is Type 1, the rarest and most valuable of the three versions. I cannot tell if it is counterfeit unless I examine it, which includes dimensions and weight. However, it is probably a good coin if you have had it 4 years or more. The foreign counterfeits seem to have shown up since that time.

The only problem that I see is that it is overgraded (sorry). The reverse shows much wear and there is a pit at 180 degrees. I have learned the hard way not to purchase any third party graded coin except PCGS, NGC, and ANACS. Your coin will grade different if it was certified by one of these three.

If there is a major coin show in your area, you might want to take it there for a complimentary evaluation by one of the three if they are there.

I am not an expert, and my opinion is based only on my own experiences.

### **#4. J.B. sent the following email:**

Can you give me any idea what the value of chips from the Havana Country Club are worth?

Response from Frank Putrow.

Thank you for the inquiry regarding the value of casino chips from the Havana Country Club. The limiting factors of the Cuban casino chips are condition, quantity manufactured, and Peso value.

This is the same for most Cuban Numismatic items, except coins, paper money, and stamps. There is no official catalog with the Cuban casino chips listed and priced. I would suggest that you go to Ebay and sort by the chip(s) in question. You should get a general idea of their market value. If this does not give you the information that you need, let me know, and I might be able to research the specific casino chips that you have.

## **FROM THE KITCHEN: CHICKEN CACCIATORE**

### **Ingredients:**

1 whole chicken, with skin and bones, cut up	. ¾ cup crisp white wine, like Pinot Grigio.
Flour for dredging.	1 tsp. dried oregano, or 2 tps. chopped fresh.
Salt and pepper to taste.	¼ pound white button mushrooms, sliced.
3 tablespoons olive oil.	sliced green olives, to taste.
2 yellow onions, sliced into ¼ inch pieces.	1 pound spaghetti, or 2 cups rice (optional).
2 garlic cloves, chopped.	1 green and 1 yellow pepper, sliced thick.
12 Roma tomatoes, peeled, seeded, and quartered, or 1 large can diced tomatoes.	

Dredge chicken pieces in flour and shake off excess. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Heat olive oil in large skillet and brown chicken in hot oil; about 3-4 minutes per side. Remove chicken from skillet and set aside. Lower heat to medium and add onions, garlic and peppers. Saute until soft: about 8-9 minutes. Add tomatoes and return chicken to skillet. Pour wine over top and sprinkle with oregano. Cook, covered, about 25 minutes. Add sliced mushrooms and olives, and cook, uncovered an additional 8-9 minutes. Stir occasionally. Meanwhile, cook the spaghetti in salted water, OR rice per instructions on the package. Place pasta OR rice onto each plate and cover with Chicken Cacciatore. Serve immediately. Serves 4.
